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HOW HE SPENT HIS SUMMER VACATIONS

Welcome back from our summer hiatus. Here's a story about how a Swedish immigrant used his summer vacations to learn about the history of his adopted country.

STUDYING THE HISTORY OF HIS ADOPTED LAND

Carl "Hal" Hjalmar Seaberg immigrated to the United States around 1923 and found work in a steel plant in Midland, PA. That was a seven day a week job in the blast furnaces, with two weeks off for a vacation in the summers. Seaberg used his vacations to learn about his adopted country. Here's how he put it:

After I had learned to master the new language well enough and could absorb the news and other contemporary things from papers and magazines I set out to find out all I could about America. But I worked seven days a week at the blast furnaces and the only time I had for that purpose was my yearly two weeks vacation. I used them well.

Hal Seaberg believed that in order to know a nation, one must study its history and its great men. This led him to Abraham Lincoln, who Seaberg felt embodied his vision of the American Dream. He wrote:

I needed someone who could give me a full compensation for all that I voluntarily left behind when I swore allegiance to the United States of America. I found it in Abraham Lincoln.

IN LINCOLN'S FOOTSTEPS

It was while making a scrapbook about Gettysburg that Seaberg decided to focus his travels on sites with ties to Lincoln. He sought out Dr. Harry E. Pratt, then the Executive Secretary of the Abraham Lincoln Association in Springfield, IL. Pratt provided Seaberg a list of Lincoln scholars and collectors, and suggested an itinerary. These helped Seaberg to plan his Lincoln-inspired travels.

One of Seaberg's first stops on his Lincoln-inspired travels was a visit to Steubenville, Ohio, to see the statue of Lincoln's Secretary of War, Edwin McMasters Stanton. On another occasion, Seaberg met with William H. Townsend in Lexington, KY, to see his collection of Lincoln-related books, original letters, oil paintings, and statues. Here's how Seaberg described this visit:

When he brought out some of his most treasured items, take for instance the book "The Revised Statutes of Indiana", I found it kept in a specially made black box, lettered in gold outside, lined with black velvet inside. This was the very book which Mr. Lincoln as a lad of 16 borrowed from David Turnham, the Constable at Gentryville. Mr. Townsend opened the book where the Constitution of the United States was printed. "Your eyes" he said "are looking at the same page, where Mr. Lincoln for the first time read the Constitution of the United States". Quite a thrill to be sure.

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HAL SEABERG'S TRAVELOGUES

How is it that we know about Hal Seaberg's travels? He documented his travels in two travelogues.

"Twice a Pilgrim through the Lincoln Country" is a 65-page typed manuscript in which he described his travels in 1939 and 1940 through Ohio, West Virginia, Tennessee, Kentucky, Indiana, and Illinois. In this document he described the allure of studying Lincoln:

Really what I have learned about Mr. Lincoln is not very much yet but I am increasing my knowledge every day and I am happy and forever grateful for that privilege. Governor Horner [Governor of Illinois, 1933-1940] says:

"No man can know Lincoln too well and no man can know him at all without becoming better for that knowledge." Therein lies the inestimable value of America's greatest treasure, a hope for all time to come, a gift for all humanity.

"On the Lincoln Ancestral Trail" is a 20-page account of his travel in 1941 from Massachusetts to Virginia. Both travelogues include photographs of Seaberg and the sites he visited.

Seaberg continued his Lincoln-inspired travels through 1942 in the hope of visiting all the sites recommended to him.

THE HAL SEABERG TRAVELOGUES and CORRESPONDENCE

The Hal Seaberg Travelogues and Correspondence, 1939-1942 (MS 1013)

is in the <u>Illinois History & Lincoln Collections</u> of the University of Illinois Library in Urbana, Illinois.

Besides the two travelogues, the Seaberg collection includes nine letters from Seaberg to Pratt. These help current readers track the progression of his planning and enthusiasm for his Lincoln-inspired travel project. Seaberg relates in these how thrilled he was with kindnesses he received from people during his research and travels. We learn, too, of a group trip in 1940 with other Lincoln enthusiasts that Seaberg called the "Pilgrimage Party".

THE ILLINOIS HISTORY & LINCOLN COLLECTIONS
